



# Rosa Mystica Mission September 11-18, 2022 • Mindanao, Philippines

#### • WHEN DID THE MISSION START?

The Rosa Mystica Mission was founded in 2007 by ACIM (Association Catholique des Infirmières et des Médecins) President Dr. Jean-Pierre Dickès and Fr. Daniel Couture, Superior of the SSPX Asian District at the time.

#### ◆ WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE MISSION?

The purpose of the mission is outreach to the impoverished people by providing medical and spiritual assistance.

Every year for a duration of one week, volunteers, doctors, surgeons, nurses, nursing aides, opticians, and pharmacists from all over the world come together with the same aim. The travelling mission covers three remote places located north of the island of Mindanao, the greatest southernmost island of the Philippine Archipelago.

#### **\*** WHAT IS THE ROLE OF SSPX IN THE MISSION?

The SSPX provides the necessary spiritual help through the presence of its priests and by promoting Rosa Mystica.

#### \* HAS IT BEEN SUCCESSFUL? Since 2007, tens of thousands of

patients have received medical attention and spiritual help!

Two years after having been forced to stop, the volunteers of the Rosa Mystica Mission were finally able to return to the Philippines to continue their work.

#### **SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 11**

The mission began in the Santa Lucia district of Butuan, a major city on the island of Mindanao. The morning started with a High Mass celebrated by Fr. Jean-Michel Gomis from Singapore who came to assist the French-speaking volunteers.



In the afternoon, Fr. Timothy Pfeiffer led the traditional procession as everybody followed by praying the rosary on dusty and barely passable roads.







The faithful expressed their gratitude and welcomed the volunteers with a spectacle of songs and dances.

#### MONDAY AND TUESDAY SEPTEMBER 12-13

Volunteers began their first two days of a busy schedule having been assigned to their different The Moldovan surgeon Alexandru could practice his art in the excision of some lipoms. Dr. de Geofroy assigned the dental extractions to himself: he had to "give a dream smile" to a 13-year-old girl. The children always have a lollipop in their mouths instead of eating fruits, which are too expensive for these poor people in the slums.

Apart from common diseases in the Philippines such as diabetes and high blood pressure, doctors have diagnosed cases of tuberculosis, scabies, and schistosomiasis - a parasitic disease commonly found in areas with unsanitary waters. A 3-yearold child came in with a cardiac defect that required surgery. The same happened to a 35-year-old widow and the mother of a 5-year-old who has a peritoneal tumor complicated by ascites [excess fluid in the peritoneal cavity].



#### About the district of Santa Lucía .....

Santa Lucia is located below the Agusan River. This slum where misery is hidden behind magnificent lush vegetation is usually flooded



#### WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY SEPTEMBER 14-15

On Wednesday morning, the group of volunteers made their two hour journey to Cantugas to reach another forgotten village of the Mamanwas, an aboriginal tribe with whom Fr. Tim launched the mission in 2020.

Some decades ago, this nomadic aboriginal tribe was dispossessed of its ancestral lands and beautiful forested mountains that were rich in all sorts of resources, bordering the splendid Lake Mainit, by the government. The tribe was resettled in hovels made of concrete blocks and given some land on the plain dominated by their ancestors. The government laws have decreed that it was necessary



to "preserve their tribal identity and culture" in order to ease their mind. However, nurse Yolly immediately perceived the contradictory policies to the disadvantage of the poor people as they were kept in ignorance, deprived of proper schooling, and were in spiritual darkness. Since the ecclesiastical authorities complied for many years, all efforts to evangelise were weakened. However, after some long legal battles,

the Mamanwa tribe was finally able to regain the ownership of its ancestral lands.

A providential encounter (see sidebar) with some members of the tribe led Fr. Tim to understand that the villagers were facing a complex situation. The village's tribal chief, Datu, explained their deep desire to receive teaching, but the fear of displeasing the government would inevitably result in the loss of any support from the authorities. The Covid crisis aggravated the situation which brought on a very severe confinement, because the local authorities were frightened by the arrival of "foreigners" constantly requiring and producing travel passes. However, this did not deter Fr. Tim, but instead launched him into this missionary adventure with more zeal and determination for which he is well known.

What led Fr. Tim to start this new mission in 2020?

One evening in December 2019, in the capital of Mindanao, 300 kilometers south of Cantugas, Fr. Tim saw some suspicious shadows moving at the back of his church in Davao. He discovered some beggars who were seeking asylum. They were being pursued by the police because begging was forbidden.

They were Mamanwas who came down from their village of Cantugas to seek help during this Christmas season. Fr. Tim listened to their story, gave them food, and talked to them about the Good Lord and the Blessed Virgin Mary. He gave them miraculous medals and promised that he would go and visit them.

Taking with him his catechists from Butuan, and the faithful and indefatigable Yolly, a permanent member of ACIM-Asia, nurse, and catechist, Fr. Tim could honor his promise he made to the tribe. In February 2020, Yolly finally settled in the village and started her outreach. Despite many obstacles, particularly the untrust by the Mamanwas of the "City people", Yolly persevered and managed to gain their trust through her patience, conforming to their simple and poor standard of living, and helping to solve their daily problems. So without delay, she prepared them for baptism.

Two years later, Fr. Tim was able to baptize twenty adults and children during Easter 2020. His evangelisation mission was both challenging and difficult. He had to face paganism and its virulent followers who forbade him access to the communal courtyard after the first Mass he celebrated there. Protestant sects did a lot of proselytizing and their financial means attracted

people away from his efforts. But the village's tribal chief, Datu, and his wife kept their promise they made to Fr. Tim to pray the Rosary faithfully on Sundays.

Two years ago, the children and many adults in the village did not know how to kneel nor put their hands together to pray. But now, walking behind the statue of Our Lady of Sorrows through the village paths, the children were singing the Ave Maria at the top of their voices, in Latin and in Visaya. While listening to them singing the Ave Maria in their local language, which was translated by their catechists, the volunteers understood that for them, a golden light was finally shining!

In the evening, at the little welcome vigil, these "forgotten kids" of the world, with eyes glowing with gratitude, simply asked us to "give them a hand to lead them to other tomorrows."

On Wednesday morning, Mass was celebrated under the roof of the first building of a complex that Fr. Tim plans to build and which will include a chapel, the first foundations of which can already be seen, as well as a catechism room.





More than 150 patients showed up at the reception table for consultation that morning. The consultations took place in a school, which was closed for the mission. For the occasion, the children were given leave by the school director.

During the routine checkups, a 3-year-old child was found to have an acute asthma attack, and two pregnant women were diagnosed for pre-eclampsia.

Two home visits were made: one to a school mistress's daughter, 27, who was born prematurely. She was having regular convulsions without treatment, and was referred to a neurologist. The second was to a man in his sixties, with heart failure and difficulty breathing. Through the consultations, the doctors discovered that the vast majority of women had received free contraceptives, and some

had undergone tubal ligation.
What Fr. Couture and Dr.
Dickès feared 20 years ago is
unfortunately coming true that
the "reproductive health" of these
women was being compromised.
At Fr. Couture's request in 2004,
Dr. Dickès made a tour of the
medical facilities in order to
alert health professionals to this
great danger. The tour was at
the origin of the Rosa Mystica
Mission.







#### FRIDAY AND SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 16-17


The last two days of the mission were spent in Surigao City at the northern tip of the island of Mindanao.



On Friday, morning Mass was held on the esplanade of the Shrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Help located at the top of a hill. It was a splendid place overlooking the city of Surigao and offering a 180 degree view of the sea but exposed to all the winds that blow hard these days, accompanied by intermittent torrential rains.

On Saturday, the last day of the mission, volunteers visited the neighbourhood of Canlanipa, one of the poorest places in the city. Its location by the sea could have made it a nice residential area, but its inhabitants are very low-wage dock workers at the port of Surigao, the large cargo ships of which can be seen on the opposite shore.

The volunteers followed Fr. Tim through the maze of alleys in the slum that are so familiar to him. The inhabitants have built a charming oratory dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary where children and adults gather regularly for catechism and the recitation of the rosary.

December 5-8, 2022 • Manila, Philippines

# Thou shalt rejoice in thy children because they shall all be blessed and shall be gathered to the Lord (Tob. 13:17)

They are over now, those three days, so eagerly desired, so anxiously prepared for, so thoroughly lived and enjoyed – the three days when the entire District of Asia, was "en fête" for the golden jubilee of the Society of St. Pius X.

#### TUESDAY DECEMBER 6TH (FIRST DAY)




The day ended with a Solemn High Requiem Mass, where we remembered our dear Fr. Daniel Yagan (+2021), who was called by God unexpectedly at










#### WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 7TH (SECOND DAY)

On the 7th December at 9 am, Fr. Etienne Demornex (see picture on the right) gave a frightening talk on the 'extraordinary actions of Devil'. Does the Devil exert such actions that are observable phenomena? Yes, concludes Fr. Demornex, and he even argues that it is not wise to underestimate this enemy. It is stupidity to cultivate an ignorance of the enemy to the point of blindness to his actions on men; for in such blindness, it is impossible to face an enemy, let alone hold him at bay or conquer him. This is to invite defeat, to welcome slavery, to yield supinely to a conquest that in this case is radical, irrevocable, eternal. He invited the priests to be familiar with the 'Handbook of the Exorcists' recently published by the General House. Like a physician, we are called in to an illness that we must first diagnose and then judiciously apply the remedy.






#### Looking at their intense faces, the talk was frightening indeed!

Those who conversed with him were charmed by the warmth of his cordiality, his strength of heart, so sensitive, so kind and good to everybody. Later in the afternoon, Fr. Therasian presented the exciting events and drama at the Council of Ephesus together with the role of St. Cyril of Alexandria.

#### THURSDAY DECEMBER 8TH (THIRD DAY)

The third day brought the celebration to a great climax. A Solemn High Mass of thanksgiving, with priests and brothers serving at the altar and singing the chant, was indeed a rare




event in the District. The Oblates sisters provided some sublime polyphony as well. At High Mass, Father General received the oblation of one of his priests, Fr. Joseph Rajadurai. He also received the profession of eight tertiaries.

The sisters of Davao sung a few polyphonic pieces while a few of the faithful sung several Filipino folk songs. The gorgeous costumes and their singing skill will easily produce an unforgettable impression on the audience. Solemn Vespers followed, during which the 'Magnificat' was warmly sung by all present, and it was not only from the "Liber Usualis", but from our hearts.















The next morning, most of the priests tried to print their 'boarding passes' and locate the nearest 'cab' to take them to their usual and familiar destination – the airport. In spite of their nonchalant expressions, there palpitates in the heart of each priest an immense feeling of joy and unfeigned thankfulness to God for the fifty years gone by, and with a firm confidence that His loving care will continue in the years to come.






